SUNDAY REFLECTION

When was the last time that you or I were 'astonished' or 'amazed' when faced with Jesus – in the Scriptures or in Eucharist? When have we prepared ourselves to come to Eucharist to experience the mystery unfolding from the hand of our Father? Perhaps the daily celebration of Eucharist has become too routine: familiar Scripture readings, the same bread and wine. Even the new sound of our praying can be a distraction. It is too easy to forget that we are invited to Eucharist, invited to experience the continuing mystery of God's great love for us:

A mystery that draws us into the intimate mystery of our salvation and redemption: the death and rising of Jesus; a mystery that expresses our God's desire that you and I be one with him by sharing in the Body and Blood of his Son Jesus; a mystery that makes us more fully the Body of Christ, the Church; a mystery that continues to transform you and me in our efforts to be the Savior walking the earth today.

I was awakened again to this sense of 'mystery' as I was reading an article entitled: "Let us proclaim the mystery of faith." The writer offered me a thought that has led me to some prayerful reflection: "The invitation that comes to us again and again in Scripture, directly or indirectly, is to consent to a relationship with the Lord of Mysteries and the God of Surprises, who waits patiently for us with open arms (and delights we can't even guess at), while demanding that we put away our childish cravings for smaller securities so as to enter into a wider, richer, more complex intimacy" — into mystery. (McEntyre, Weavings, Jan-Feb 2006)

As I continued to read today's Gospel, I was struck by the words of the unclean spirit: "I know who you are, the Holy One of God." It is possible to know Jesus without really knowing Jesus in the Scriptural sense. When we really encounter Jesus, our hearts are changed, transformed. When Jesus encounters us in the mystery of the Scriptures and Eucharist, we are invited into mystery – a moment of intimate encounter with our God who is loving us into a deeper union with him. The more willing we are to entrust our heart to God, the more God can mold us more fully into the image of his Son Jesus.

Once again, you and I are invited into the mystery of this Eucharist. Jesus is present in his Word and will be present in Sacrament. Will we be open enough to being "astonished" and "amazed" during this encounter?

EUTHANASIA BILL STAY INVOLVED: IT'S NOT YET TOO LATE!

The federal government continues to seek to expand state-sanctioned killing of the sick and infirm. This week is critical. This week is your chance to advocate against Same-Day Death as Senators consider the Government's proposed legislation expanding euthanasia in Canada.

According to the 2020 Health Canada report, "The number of cases of MAID in 2019 represents an increase of 26.1% over 2018 numbers."

Bill C-7 would make more and more Canadians vulnerable to premature death. That's why physicians, First Nations communities, disability rights advocates, and countless concerned Canadians have been sounding the alarm about this legislation.

At the beginning of February, the Legal and Constitutional Affairs Senate Committee will begin their official 3-day study on Bill C-7.

This is why it's imperative for Senators to hear from you now—this week.

As all Senators will participate in the vote on amendments to Bill C-7, we need to reach out to as many Senators as possible. Please phone at least two Senators from your province.

- 1. Take a minute to click on a Senator's name to bring up his or her contact information.
- 2. Phone the Senator and thank him or her for their service to Canada.
- 3. Then, take a moment to express your concerns about the Government's expansion of euthanasia that would allow for Same-Day Death, removal of the need for consent at the moment, and the removal of the need for two independent witnesses, and the need for conscience protection for Catholic and other healthcare providers and institutions.

Please do what you can. Reach out to the Senators and let them know you stand for life, for adequate, compassionate and life-affirming palliative care.

Letters of Reference for Catholic Teacher Applicants

If you or one of your children are currently studying to become a teacher in our Catholic schools, part of the application process for the Board includes a letter of reference from your pastor. If you are from this parish and intend to ask for a reference letter, please note that you will have to be attending Mass here regularly and participating in a parish ministry before such a recommendation will be given. If you have a son or daughter currently in Teacher's College and they intend to use Merciful Redeemer as the parish from which they will request a letter of reference, but they do not attend this parish (because they are away at school), they will be required to obtain a letter from the pastor of the parish where they are attending while away at school. Please remember all our teachers present and future - in your prayers!

Meet the Messengers: Isaiah, faithful and Available

This is the second part of a series where Thomas Smith takes a closer look at six prophets from the Old Testament, God's messengers. Be sure to check the bulletin for the next four weeks to catch the rest of the series!

"Here I am! Send me!" (Isaiah 6:8)

When it comes to the Old Testament prophets, one could argue that Isaiah is without peer.

Isaiah has been called by many "the Fifth Gospel" because his prophecies predict so many aspects of the life of Jesus, from his birth to his enthronement in heaven. He is quoted over ninety times in the New Testament and represents three-quarters of all the prophetic readings we hear during the Advent and Christmas seasons. His writings are vast (sixty-six chapters), powerful and poetic.

Isaiah was faced with a daunting challenge: His voice was to be raised during the period of the Divided Kingdom, in the late eighth century (700s BC). His audience was the southern kingdom of Judah who seemed blind to the dangers of covenant unfaithfulness.

Most men would shrink at the task of preaching for decades to a people so deaf to his message, but not our prophet.

What was the secret of his consistent courage?

- 1. He focused on the Lord. Isaiah is given a vision of God on the throne (Isaiah 6:1-4). God was perfect in holiness, high and lifted up, in control of his universe. That vision of God's power and presence was the source of Isaiah's strength. It certainly sustained him when he saw the state of his own people's sinfulness. He knew his task to preach was a God-sized one, but his powerful God would help him to fulfill it. In fact, one translation of the name Isaiah is "The Lord is my helper."
- 2. He recognized and acknowledged his own sinfulness and inadequacies (the truth about himself). Faced with the holiness of the Lord, he cried out, "Woe is me! For I am lost; for I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips" (Isaiah 6:5). This helped to keep him humble before the task at hand. And the Lord responded by cleansing and preparing his prophet.
 - 3. He responded with availability and generosity

to God's call, "Here I am! Send me!" (Isaiah 6:8). Availability is no small virtue. Think of how many acts of love, mercy, or service we never perform, all because we are "too busy" or "unavailable." Or consider how many times we have hesitated to share the good news because we "leave that to the professionals" or we feel inadequate. Pope Francis said, "Our falling short of perfection should be no excuse; on the contrary, mission is a constant stimulus not to remain mired in mediocrity but to continue growing" (Evangelii Gaudium, 121). Another put it this way, "God does not ask for our ability or our inability, but our availability."

Imitating Isaiah

The life of Isaiah can become a great spiritual checkup for us. In light of his life, ask yourself these questions:

- 1. What great task is before you?
- 2. How can focusing on God's presence and power sustain you?
- 3. Are you honest about your own sinfulness before the Lord and believe he desires to cleanse you and make you whole?
- 4. Finally, do you have a generous and willing spirit to respond to the needs before the Church?

Isaiah's story begins with courage in the face of great challenges, and he was faithful to the very end. Jewish tradition tells us that Isaiah was martyred by being sawn in two by the wicked King Manasseh (an event that may be referenced in Hebrews 11:37).

Through his intercession and God's grace, may we face the particular challenges of our life with courage and consistency.
