SUNDAY REFLECTION

"Is not our life on earth drudgery?"

Let's face it. Try as we might to always look at the bright side of life, each and every one of us have times in our lives when we would answer Job's question with a resounding "yes." The burdens of life are real. Setbacks in life are painful. Headaches - and heartache - are a part of being human. We need to be honest. We need to name and address those areas of our lives in which we feel weighed down and burdened. However, wallowing in or dwelling upon the negative can be far more dangerous and debilitating to our spiritual, emotional, psychological, social and mental health than the troubles themselves.

Francis de Sales observed that dwelling on the burdens of life "upsets the soul, arouses inordinate fears, creates disgust for prayer, stupefies and oppresses the brain, deprives the mind of prudence, resolution, judgment and courage, and destroys its strength. In a word, such sorrow is like a severe winter that spoils all the beauty of the country and weakens all the animals. It takes away all sweetness from the soul and renders it disabled."

What is the best remedy for melancholy, for the temptation to focus only on what is wrong, what is broken, what is painful? The combination of prayer, good works, and good friends:

Prayer – "Prayer is a sovereign remedy for it lifts up the soul to God who is our joy and consolation."

Good works – "By means of sorrow the evil one tries to make us weary of doing what is good, but if he sees that we won't give up on doing good, then he will stop troubling us."

Good friends – "Humbly and sincerely reveal to another all the feelings, affections and suggestions that proceed from your sadness. Try to talk to spiritual friends frequently and spend time with them as much as you possibly can during this period" of dryness.

St. Francis de Sales claimed "the evil one is pleased with sadness and melancholy because he himself is sad and melancholy and will be so for all eternity. Hence, Satan desires that everyone should be like himself." Hence the expression misery loves company.

In the face of life's burdens and difficulties let us do our level best to deprive the evil one of our company and walk in the company prayerful, positive and proactive people.

Euthanasia Bill

STAY INVOLVED: IT'S NOT YET TOO LATE!

The federal government continues to seek to expand state-sanctioned killing of the sick and infirm. This week is critical. This week is your chance to advocate against Same-Day Death as Senators consider the Government's proposed legislation expanding euthanasia in Canada.

According to the 2020 Health Canada report, "The number of cases of MAID in 2019 represents an increase of 26.1% over 2018 numbers."

Bill C-7 would make more and more Canadians vulnerable to premature death. That's why physicians, First Nations communities, disability rights advocates, and countless concerned Canadians have been sounding the alarm about this legislation.

At the beginning of February, the Legal and Constitutional Affairs Senate Committee will begin their official 3-day study on Bill C-7.

This is why it's imperative for Senators to hear from you now— this week.


As all Senators will participate in the vote on amendments to Bill C-7, we need to reach out to as many Senators as possible. Please phone at least two Senators from your province.

- 1. Take a minute to click on a Senator's name to bring up his or her contact information.
- 2. Phone the Senator and thank him or her for their service to Canada.
- 3. Then, take a moment to express your concerns about the Government's expansion of euthanasia that would allow for Same-Day Death, removal of the need for consent at the moment, and the removal of the need for two independent witnesses, and the need for conscience protection for Catholic and other healthcare providers and institutions.

Please do what you can. Reach out to the Senators and let them know you stand for life, for adequate, compassionate and life-affirming palliative care.

Meet the Messengers: Jeremiah, Prophet of Hope

This is the third part of a series where Thomas Smith takes a closer look at six prophets from the Old Testament, God's messengers. Be sure to check the bulletin for the next four weeks to catch the rest of the series!

If there was ever a man that would have every reason to be without hope it would be the prophet Jeremiah. He's called "the weeping prophet" for a reason.

A Prophet of Hope

Called by God when just a teenager (Jeremiah 1:5-7), our prophet was roundly rejected and maligned by his own people, forsaken by his family, and even forbidden from marrying (Jeremiah 16:1-2). He would remain in Jerusalem to the bitter end, witnessing the fiery destruction of the Temple and the public slaughter of the Davidic line. He earned the right to write Lamentations.

And yet, in spite of all of this, he remains for me a prophet of hopefulness. Jeremiah understood that hope has little to do with external circumstances and everything to do with God, the true hope of Israel (Jeremiah 14:8).

At his darkest hour, as Babylon surrounded his starving city, and while imprisoned by his fellow Jews, Jeremiah did something amazing. He bought a tract of land from his cousin in Anathoth, a parcel already conquered and leveled by the Babylonian armies.

In modern parlance, he put his money where his mouth was. He had already promised the people that after a seventy-year exile for their sins, they would return to the land again, settling their ancestral cities. Now his actions made his prophecies sure.

To the gathered witnesses, he placed the signed deed before the people and sealed it in an earthenware jar as a kind of time capsule, declaring, "houses and fields and vineyards shall again be bought in this land" (Jeremiah 32:15). While the cities' walls were being breached, he surrounded the little remnant of Jews with a fortress of hope. Even in his Lamentations, he could say:

"But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope: the steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. The Lord is my portion, says my soul, therefore I will hope in him." - Lamentations 3:21-23

Speaking through his prophet, the Lord declared:

"For I know the plans I have for you, says the LORD, plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope." - Jeremiah 29:11

Imitating Jeremiah

When we look around our world today, it sometimes seems there is little reason to hope. And yet, difficult times are the very moments we must "lean into" the virtue of hope, given to each of us at baptism.

Echoing the Lord's promise to Jeremiah, Pope Emeritus Benedict said:

"Here too we see as a distinguishing mark of Christians the fact that they have a future: it is not that they know the details of what awaits them, but they know in general terms that their life will not end in emptiness. Only when the future is certain as a positive reality does it become possible to live the present as well." - Spes Salvi, 2

Finally, this hope isn't for our own consolation and strength. It is meant to be shared! Like Jeremiah we must proclaim this living hope in our word and deeds! I love how St. Peter puts it:

"Always be prepared to make a defense to any one who calls you to account for the hope that is in you, yet do it with gentleness and reverence." - 1 Peter 3:15

What are some of the concrete ways you can be a herald of hope to those around you?
