SUNDAY REFLECTION



Something remarkable happened on that mountain.

Consider the possibility that it was not Jesus who changed but rather it was Peter, James and John who were transformed. Imagine that this account from Mark's Gospel documents the experience of Peter, James and John as their eyes were opened; their vision widened, enabling them to see without impediment the virtually blinding light of Jesus' love that flowed from every fiber of his being.

Indeed, every day of Jesus' life something of that remarkable brilliance, that remarkable passion, and that remarkable glory was revealed to people of all ages, stages and states of life. The shepherds and magi saw it; the elders in the temple saw it; the guests at a wedding saw it; a woman caught in adultery saw it; a boy possessed by demons saw it; a man born blind saw it; a good thief saw it.

If so many others could recognize it in a word, a glance, or a touch, why might Peter, James and John have required such extra effort in helping them to see Jesus' glory? Perhaps it was because they were so close to Jesus; perhaps it was because they were with him every day; perhaps it was because, on some level, they had somehow taken his glory for granted.

What about us? Do we recognize that same divine glory present in us, present in others, present in creation, present in even the simplest and most ordinary, everyday experiences of justice, truth, healing, forgiveness, reconciliation and compassion? Or do we take it for granted?

St. Francis de Sales saw the Transfiguration as a "glimpse of heaven." During this season of Lent, may our eyes, our minds and our hearts be transfigured and transformed. May we see more clearly the glory of a God who always loves us, who redeems us, who heals us, who forgives us, who challenges us, who pursues us, who strengthens us and who inspires us.

May we grow in our ability, through the quality of our lives, to make that "glimpse of heaven" visible in the lives of others.

SACRAMENTAL PREPARATION NEWS

Even though the Covid-19 pandemic is still upon us, we must continue to move forward with preparing our children for the reception of various Sacraments this year. Because this pandemic will be with us for a while, we need be smart, but not fearful; prudent, not scared. We need God, perhaps especially now, and the Sacraments are privileged encounters with Him Who is our life and our salvation.

It is understood that some parents or children may wish to defer the reception and celebration of first Reconciliation, first Holy Communion, or Confirmation, for reasons of legitimate health concerns. Kindly note that we celebrated first Communions and Confirmations in the autumn of 2020 in a way that was reverent, safe, socially distanced and secure. We do everything we can to ensure that those who come are protected and can worship without fear. There have been NO CASES OF TRANSMISSION IN CATHOLIC CHURCHES IN THE ARCHDIOCESE OF TORONTO, thanks to our dedicated volunteers and the sanitizing and ushering we have in place. You are as safe in this church as you are anywhere, and more so than many other public places. That being said, we respect the rights and decisions of parents to defer, if they wish.

For those who will be receiving Holy Communion for the first time, and for those who are to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation, note the following:

Reconciliation for Children receiving first Holy Communion:

Wednesday 24 March: 4:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m.

This date has been changed from 10 February. There will be a number of priests available and spread out throughout the Church.

*For those Gr 2 students who will not participate in the Confessions scheduled for 24 March, your child should still make their first Confession before they receive Holy Communion for the first time. Kindly bring your child to Confession at any other regularly scheduled time (Tuesday, 6:00 p.m. – 7:00 p.m.; Saturday 4:00 p.m. – 5:00 p.m.). This is a good opportunity for you also, as parents, to make a Lenten Confession, to lead by example and to be reconciled to God.

Meet the Messengers: Malachi and His Relevance Today

When people tell me they think the Old Testament prophets are irrelevant or simply artifacts of the past, I often point to the prophet Malachi.

Consider the challenges he faced: a poorly catechized people, priest scandals, low offertories, widespread divorce, and general spiritual malaise among God's people.

Sound at all familiar? Truly, there is nothing new under the sun.

This is the fifth part of a series where Thomas Smith takes a closer look at six prophets from the Old Testament, God's messengers. Be sure to check the bulletin next to catch the last installment of the series! If you missed the previous posts, you can look at our past five bulletins to catch up!

Hollow Rituals

It's hard to believe that things could look so grim in the time of Malachi. After all, the people have returned to the Promised Land under the Persian decrees. The temple has been rebuilt and the city of Jerusalem fortified. Strong leaders were given to them by God, including Ezra, Nehemiah, and the prophets Haggai and Zechariah. Their daily rhythms have returned to relative normalcy.

These seem like ideal conditions, and yet Malachi's time reminds us that the spiritual life requires constant care and vigilance. St. John Paul II warned us that we can easily fall into what he called "hollow ritualism" (Catechesi Tradendae, 23), or simply going through the motions.

It was a danger for the Jews offering continual sacrifices in the Temple, and it can be one for us who attend Mass daily or weekly.

Renewing the Covenant

Then as now, we hear the heart cry of God:

"Return to me, and I will return to you." - Malachi 3:7, RSV

That turning is the ongoing process of conversion. It requires more than just outward participation. There must be an interior transformation, a conforming of our lives to Christ, a renewing of our mind (Romans 12:2).

Every day we must intentionally cooperate with God's grace.

One of the helpful ways I have found to do that is to pray the simple prayer of renewal that Pope Francis gave us in Evangelii Gaudium. It is so simple, yet profound. It gathers together the great themes of Scripture, especially the message and mission of the Prophets. I've been praying it every day and have shared it with thousands of Catholics on a prayer card. This prayer has become part of my consciousness now and it speaks to me throughout the day to more clearly see Christ and be Christ in the world.

Let's close this series by praying it together:

"Lord, I have let myself be deceived; in a thousand ways I have shunned your love, yet here I am once more, to renew my covenant with you. I need you. Save me once again, Lord, take me once more into your redeeming embrace." - Evangelii Gaudium, 3

An Update from Cardinal Thomas Collins



My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Lent is a penitential season in which, each year, we prepare ourselves for the celebration of Easter by following the call of Jesus to engage in prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. This past year of pandemic has itself been a kind of penitential season, forcing us to consider our human fragility, and the stark fact of sickness and death.

Many people have experienced great privation, which has come uninvited, and not as a penitential choice. And yet, just as the voluntary penances of Lent can lead us to a deeper appreciation of our human frailty – the fact that we are dust and to dust we shall return - and of our need for God, so too we pray that these involuntary privations may be experienced in a way that will lead not to fruitless anger, but to a deeper self awareness, and to compassion for our neighbours who are suffering.

Especially in a time of crisis, our sacramental life is essential. Here is an update on the operation of churches in the Archdiocese of Toronto. As of this writing, the following restrictions remain in effect for places of worship in the archdiocese:

Durham Region, Simcoe County, Orangeville and York Region churches – these areas have returned to the "Red" (Control) designation, as determined by the Province of Ontario. This permits churches in these regions to operate sacramental celebrations at 30%

capacity.

Toronto and Peel Region churches – the province, in consultation with local medical officers of health, has extended the stay-at-home order in these regions until at least March 8, 2021, restricting places of worship to no more than 10 people (including the celebrant) in the church at any given time.

I am heartened that public Masses have returned to more than 35% of our parishes. Where this is not yet possible, I have asked all parishes to remain open each day for a period of private prayer. Permission has also been granted to parishes in these regions to continue to offer Holy Communion services on the weekend. Please check with your local parish regarding their current schedule.

I am grateful for the many sacrifices that you have made over the past 11 months. Throughout the pandemic, out of love for neighbour, in an effort to minimize the transmission of Covid-19, we have followed the health authorities' direction on significant restrictions, limiting the ability of the faithful to gather. This has resulted in great spiritual sacrifice and pain for all of us, and especially for those who are isolated and vulnerable.

Despite temporary restrictions, we need to worship together, and to return to our full sacramental life as soon as is possible. We continue to urge that places of worship be treated equitably by the province; for example, it is only fair that there be a consistent approach to restrictions as they relate to retail businesses and to places of worship. Recently, a coalition of faith leaders has written to Premier Ford, highlighting the essential nature of in–person communal worship and spiritual support. If the government does not address these issues sufficiently, we will be asking for your assistance in contacting our elected officials to amplify our voices.

Once again, thank you for the sacrifices you have made. We pray for those who have died and for those who are sick, as we pray that this pandemic may soon come to an end. May God continue to bless you.
